

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

During this challenging time we are being called to gather together, even though many of us are isolated and alone in our households. It has been wonderful to see how our churches and christian organisations around the world have taken to the internet offering live streamed Masses, Holy Hours and so many resources for praying at home. Our Parish is joining this effort with a live streamed Rosary at 10:30am, Holy Hour 2 - 3pm and Lectio Divina 7pm every weekday.

We are however, aware that many of our parishioners are not able to access these resources as they do not have access to the internet. Because of this we have put together this prayer pack to lead you through Holy Week and beyond. The pack includes a variety of resources, some produced by our parish specially, others have been borrowed from other sources. Below is a list of what is included in your Prayer pack:

Liturgies at Home - Specially designed Mass Sheets so you can experience some of the wonder fo the Easter Triduum at home. There are sheets for Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Vigil/Sunday. On these sheets you will find suggestions of things you may want to use in your liturgy for example a candle, a cross etc. You may wish to pray with the parish at the same time as Fr Colm is celebrating private Mass. The times are:

Palm Sunday - 10:30am Maundy Thursday - 7pm Good Friday Service - 3pm Holy Saturday - 8pm Easter Sunday - 10:30pm

- A printed copy of Matthew's Passion for Palm Sunday, and of John's Passion For use on Good Friday
- Stations of the Cross Booklet This contains everything you will need to have a reflective time of prayer on the Passion of our Lord in your home. A video of the stations will be

released on Good Friday however there is no set time when the stations will be said so feel free to take some time whenever you want a moment of calm.

- A reflection by Fr Colm from 28th March 2020, transcribed form an audio file available on our website.
- 'Keeping Cool Through COVID-19' a wonderful document written by a retired doctor from Yorkshire with a number of ways to keep physically, spiritually and mentally healthy during your time of isolation.
- A blessed Palm Cross you may wish to use this during your Palm Sunday Liturgy or hang it on your front door/in your window etc as a sign of witness to our Lord's Passion.
- A Lectio Divina Prayer Card Every Weekday at 7pm their is a live stream of our parish Lectio Divina we normally use a reading of the day but why not pick a a passage you are unfamiliar with in your bible and pray with it.
- 'Prayers during a time of Flu and Illness' a resources from the Liturgy Office of England and Wales, this booklet contains a number of prayers that you may want to use during your time in isolation.

In this difficult time we must keep both our faith and parish community alive and thriving. We can make this possible through united prayer. In Psalm 34:4 it says 'I sought the Lord and He answered me and delivered me from all my fears'. We are called to proclaim the Lord's name as we end this season of Lent, and remember that those who trust in the Lord can never be beaten.

I encourage you all to keep regular contact with your family, friends and fellow parishioners through phone conversations and messages. The new number for the parish office, during this time of isolation, is 07391 529827.

Updated information on Holy Week from the Bishop to Clergy

Palm Sunday

The Commemoration of the Lord's Entrance into Jerusalem is to be celebrated within sacred buildings; in Cathedral churches the second form given in the Roman Missal is to be adopted; in parish churches and in other places the third form is to be used. (CDWDS Decree II).

At the Masses celebrated by priests in their parish churches, all of the palms should be blessed. The blessed palms can then be made available to the faithful in your parish to take home at a time when the current restrictions on public and social gatherings has been lifted.

Chrism Mass

The Holy Father has deferred the celebration of the Chrism Mass in Rome until it is possible to do so with a gathering of the clergy and people. The Archbishops of England and Wales have decided to act in solidarity with Pope Francis and asked other Ordinaries to do the same. After taking counsel, I have decided that our Chrism Mass will be postponed.

Mass of the Lord's Supper

The washing of feet, which is already optional, is to be omitted. At the end of the Mass of the Lord's Supper the procession is also omitted and the Blessed Sacrament is to be kept in the tabernacle. On this day the faculty to celebrate Mass in a suitable place, without the presence of the people, is exceptionally granted to all priests. (CDWDS Decree II).

Good Friday

In the Universal Prayer, Bishops will arrange to have a special intention prepared for those who find themselves in distress, the sick, the dead, (cf. Missale

Romanum). The adoration of the Cross by kissing it shall be limited solely to the celebrant. (CDWDS Decree II).

Special intentions for use in the Universal Prayer of Good Friday are being drafted; I will send these to you once completed.

Easter Vigil

The Easter Vigil is to be celebrated only in Cathedral and parish churches. At 'The Solemn Beginning of the Vigil or Lucenarium' the preparation and lighting of the fire is omitted, the Paschal Candle is lit, the procession is omitted and the Easter Proclamation (Exsultet) follows. The 'Liturgy of the Word' then takes place. For the 'Baptismal Liturgy' only the 'Renewal of Baptismal Promises' is maintained (cf. Missale Romanum). The Liturgy of the Eucharist then follows." (CDWDS Decree I & II).

Easter Day

There are no specific directives for the celebration of the Easter Mass.

Prayer Resources for Holy Week for Families and Personal prayer. The Magnificat booklet for Holy Week is recommended as an excellent resource both in printed form for those who already subscribe to it. The United States version has kindly made online access to its publication free for the time being. This provides a form of Morning, Evening and Night Prayer, the daily Mass Readings, a daily mediation and Saint of the Day: https://us.magnificat.net/free. In preparation, many would have availed themselves of the Sacrament of Reconciliation - Confession - to prepare for a fresh start at Easter.

But what does it mean for our spiritual well-being and salvation if we can't fulfil our "Easter Duties"? Many have asked, and Cardinal Vincent Nichols answers in his video which can be accessed on the E-Newsletter.

Pastoral Letter of Bishop Robert Byrne CO for distribution in Holy Week 2020

My dear Brothers and Sisters in Jesus Christ,

I especially wanted to write to you as we begin Holy Week facing the threat of the Covid-19 pandemic. I want to assure you that all the clergy and faithful are uppermost in my thoughts and prayers. Without doubt we are living in challenging times but we should see this as an opportunity to have an ever-deeper faith and trust in the Lord. In these days of Holy Week, we unite ourselves more earnestly to the sufferings of the Lord on the Cross and wait with him for the glorious day of the Resurrection and new life.

At this time, we normally look forward to participating in the events of our Lord's death and resurrection through the liturgies of the Sacred Triduum. Sadly, this year we are unable to do so. Instead we unite ourselves spiritually with the whole Church in our homes. We can do this in several ways. I would encourage all those who are able to read the texts of the Holy Week liturgies and to pray the Liturgy of the Hours or the Holy Rosary. We can also make a Spiritual Communion which prayerfully expresses our faith in Christ's presence in the Blessed Sacrament. There are a number of spiritual resources on our diocesan website to help you do this. Thanks to modern technology we can also join with our Cathedral and other churches in the diocese and elsewhere which are live-streaming the ceremonies. In these ways we are able to deepen our unity with our brothers and sisters throughout the world who are suffering with us and sometimes in a worse situation.

A number of people have asked about the Sunday Mass obligation and the requirement to make our Easter duties of receiving Holy Communion and confessing our sins. By decree of the President of the Bishops' Conference of 18th March 2020, the Bishops of England and Wales have dispensed with the Sunday obligation to attend Mass for the time being and also, for this year, the requirement to receive Holy Communion and the Sacrament of Reconciliation at Easter or thereabouts. The Bishops have asked that all should make a Perfect Act of Contrition at this time. This requires us to be contrite of heart for what we have done, know and be overwhelmed by the love and mercy of God for his children, and to approach this grace with humility and resolution not to sin again.

Many of us are bewildered by the situation in which we find ourselves. Normal life has ceased by the unprecedented measures which all of us have a duty to undertake in order to contain and stop this threat to life. Nonetheless our Catholic faith remains a vital comfort and support to us now and as we face the future. We can sustain our life of prayer by the reading of the Scriptures, praying the Rosary, novenas and litanies and using the social media to keep ourselves connected in the communion of faith.

I want to say a special word to those who are preparing to be baptized or received into full communion with the Church at the Easter Vigil. I had the pleasure of meeting many of you at the Rite of Election on the 1st Sunday of Lent. I witnessed then the excitement and enthusiasm that you had at taking this great step in your journey of faith. I am sorry that you are unable to continue this journey as you planned. I assure you that your baptism or reception will take place as soon as possible. In the meantime, please see the delay as an opportunity to deepen your love and trust in the Lord. His grace continues to work in our lives whatever the circumstances.

Let me take this opportunity to thank all those who are doing so much to support our local communities and parishes. I want to thank especially our NHS staff and all those who have care of the sick. You are doing a splendid job and we are all deeply grateful to you. Thanks also to our headteachers and staff of the numerous schools that have remained open - your work is an invaluable support to parents working in the NHS and others who are at the forefront of the battle against the Covid-19 virus.

I ask you all to remember the injunction of the Lord to love our neighbour, which has not been suspended! Please have a special care for those who are elderly or vulnerable and be ready to give them a helping hand. Please keep in your prayers those who suffer with the virus and those who care for them and for those who have died.



 ${
m You}$ may wish to have your own procession AROUND YOUR HOUSE, GARDEN OR DRIVEWAY. YOU MAY USE YOUR PALM CROSS AND SING A HYMN SUCH AS *Ride* on in majesty or Sing Hosanna

BEGIN BY READING MATTHEW 21:1-11. The crowds were shouting, "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!"

FOLLOWING YOUR PROCESSION, BEGIN BY LIGHTING YOUR CANDLE AND SAYING THE FOLLOWING PRAYER. Lord, I gather here today with my parish community in Your sight. Join our hearts as one as we worship you together from afar. Amen.

HIRST READING - ISA 50:4-7 I did not cover my face against insult— Liturgy of the Word I know I shall not be shamed.

PSALM - PS 2I

My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?

All who see me deride me. They curl their lips, they toss their heads. "He trusted in the Lord, let him save him; let him release him if this is his friend.

I will tell of your name to my brethren and praise you where they are assembled. You who fear the Lord give him praise; all sons of Jacob, give him glory. Revere him, Israel's sons.

They divide my clothing among them. They cast lots for my robe. O Lord, do not leave me alone, my strength, make haste to help me!

SECOND READING - PHIL 2:6-11 He humbled himself, but God raised him high and gave Him the name above all names

Liturgy of the Word

<u>Psalm - Ps 115</u>

The blessing-cup that we bless is a communion with the Blood of Christ.

How can I repay the Lord for his goodness to me? The cup of salvation I will raise; I will call on the Lord's name.

O precious in the eyes of the Lord is the death of his faithful.
Your servant, Lord, your servant am I;
you have loosened my bonds.

A thanksgiving sacrifice I make; I will call on the Lord's name. My vows to the Lord I will fulfil before all his people. BEGIN BY LIGHTING YOUR CANDLE. YOU MAY WANT TO SING A HYMN. START WITH THE FOLLOWING PRAYER.

Lord, as I gather with my parish community in Your sight to celebrate the gift of the Eucharist, be with me in my heart and continue to protect me in your loving embrace. Amen


After the private Mass, the Blessed Sacrament will be exposed for one hour. Please pray with the parish at this time.

THE PASSION OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST ACCORDING TO MATTHEW

Matthew 27:11-54

Now Jesus stood before the governor; and the governor asked him, "Are you the King of the Jews?" Jesus said, "You say so." But when he was accused by the chief priests and elders, he did not answer. Then Pilate said to him, "Do you not hear how many accusations they make against you?" But he gave him no answer, not even to a single charge, so that the governor was greatly amazed.

Barabbas or Jesus?

Now at the festival the governor was accustomed to release a prisoner for the crowd, anyone whom they wanted. At that time they had a notorious prisoner, called Jesus Barabbas. So after they had gathered, Pilate said to them, "Whom do you want me to release for you, Jesus[b] Barabbas or Jesus who is called the Messiah?" For he realised that it was out of jealousy that they had handed him over. While he was sitting on the judgment seat, his wife sent word to him, "Have nothing to do with that innocent man, for today I have suffered a great deal because of a dream about him." Now the chief priests and the elders persuaded the crowds to ask for Barabbas and to have Jesus killed. The governor again said to them, "Which of the two do you want me to release for you?" And they said, "Barabbas." Pilate said to them, "Then what should I do with Jesus who is called the Messiah?" All of them said, "Let him be crucified!" Then he asked, "Why, what evil has he done?" But they shouted all the more, "Let him be crucified!"

So when Pilate saw that he could do nothing, but rather that a riot was beginning, he took some water and washed his hands before the crowd, saying, "I am innocent of this man's blood; see to it yourselves." **25** Then the people as a whole answered, "His blood be on us and on our children!" So he released Barabbas for them; and after flogging Jesus, he handed him over to be crucified.

Then the soldiers of the governor took Jesus into the governor's headquarters, and they gathered the whole cohort around him. They stripped him and put a scarlet robe on him, and after twisting some thorns into a crown, they put it on his head. They put a reed in his right hand and knelt before him and mocked him, saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!" They spat on him, and took the reed and struck him on the head.

After mocking him, they stripped him of the robe and put his own clothes on him. Then they led him away to crucify him.

As they went out, they came upon a man from Cyrene named Simon; they compelled this man to carry his cross. And when they came to a place called Golgotha (which means Place of a Skull), they offered him wine to drink, mixed with gall; but when he tasted it, he would not drink it. And when they had crucified him, they divided his clothes among themselves by casting lots; then they sat down there and kept watch over him. Over his head they put the charge against him, which read, "This is Jesus, the King of the Jews."

Then two bandits were crucified with him, one on his right and one on his left. Those who passed by derided him, shaking their heads and saying, "You who would destroy the temple and build it in three days, save yourself! If you are the Son of God, come down from the cross." In the same way the chief priests also, along with the scribes and elders, were mocking him, saying, "He saved others; he cannot save himself. He is the King of Israel; let him come down from the cross now, and we will believe in him. He trusts in God; let God deliver him now, if he wants to; for he said, 'I am God's Son." The bandits who were crucified with him also taunted him in the same way.

From noon on, darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon. And about three o'clock Jesus cried with a loud voice, "Eli, Eli, lema sabachthani?" that is, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" When some of the bystanders heard it, they said, "This man is calling for Elijah." At once one of them ran and got a sponge, filled it with sour wine, put it on a stick, and gave it to him to drink. But the others said, "Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to save him." Then Jesus cried again with a loud voice and breathed his last.

At that moment the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom. The earth shook, and the rocks were split. The tombs also were opened, and many bodies of the saints who had fallen asleep were raised. After his resurrection they came out of the tombs and entered the holy city and appeared to many. Now when the centurion and those with him, who were keeping watch over Jesus, saw the earthquake and what took place, they were terrified and said, "Truly this man was God's Son!"

THE PASSION OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST ACCORDING TO JOHN John 18:1 - 19:42

Jesus went out with his disciples across the Kidron valley to where there was a garden, into which he and his disciples entered. Judas his betrayer also knew the place, because Jesus had often met there with his disciples. So Judas got a band of soldiers and guards from the chief priests and the Pharisees and went there with lanterns, torches, and weapons. Jesus, knowing everything that was going to happen to him, went out and said to them, "Whom are you looking for?"

They answered him, "Jesus the Nazorean."

He said to them, "I AM."

Judas his betrayer was also with them. When he said to them, "I AM," they turned away and fell to the ground. So he again asked them, "Whom are you looking for?"

They said, "Jesus the Nazorean."

Jesus answered, "I told you that I AM.

So if you are looking for me, let these men go."

This was to fulfill what he had said, "I have not lost any of those you gave me." Then Simon Peter, who had a sword, drew it, struck the high priest's slave, and cut off his right ear. The slave's name was Malchus. Jesus said to Peter, "Put your sword into its scabbard.

Shall I not drink the cup that the Father gave me?"

So the band of soldiers, the tribune, and the Jewish guards seized Jesus, bound him, and brought him to Annas first. He was the father-in-law of Caiaphas, who was high priest that year. It was Caiaphas who had counseled the Jews that it was better that one man should die rather than the people. Simon Peter and another disciple followed Jesus. Now the other disciple was known to the high priest, and he entered the courtyard of the high priest with Jesus. But Peter stood at the gate outside. So the other disciple, the acquaintance of the high priest, went out and spoke to the gatekeeper and brought Peter in. Then the maid who was the gatekeeper said to Peter, "You are not one of this man's disciples, are you?" He said. "I am not."

Now the slaves and the guards were standing around a charcoal fire that they had made, because it was cold, and were warming themselves. Peter was also standing there keeping warm. The high priest questioned Jesus about his disciples and about his doctrine. Jesus answered him, "I have spoken publicly to the world. I have always taught in a synagogue or in the temple area where all the Jews gather, and in secret I have said nothing. Why ask me? Ask those who heard me what I said to them. They know what I said."

When he had said this, one of the temple guards standing there struck Jesus and said, "Is this the way you answer the high priest?"

Jesus answered him, "If I have spoken wrongly, testify to the wrong; but if I have spoken rightly, why do you strike me?"

Then Annas sent him bound to Caiaphas the high priest. Now Simon Peter was standing there keeping warm.

And they said to him, "You are not one of his disciples, are you?" He denied it and said, "I am not."

One of the slaves of the high priest, a relative of the one whose ear Peter had cut off, said, "Didn't I see you in the garden with him?" Again Peter denied it. And immediately the cock crowed.

Then they brought Jesus from Caiaphas to the praetorium.

It was morning and they themselves did not enter the praetorium, in order not to be defiled so that they could eat the Passover. So Pilate came out to them and said, "What charge do you bring against this man?"

They answered and said to him, "If he were not a criminal,

we would not have handed him over to you."

At this, Pilate said to them, "Take him yourselves, and judge him according to your law."

The Jews answered him, "We do not have the right to execute anyone,"

In order that the word of Jesus might be fulfilled

that he said indicating the kind of death he would die.

So Pilate went back into the praetorium and summoned Jesus and said to him, "Are you the King of the Jews?"

Jesus answered, "Do you say this on your own or have others told you about me?"

Pilate answered, "I am not a Jew am I? Your own nation and the chief priests handed you over to me. What have you done?"

N: Jesus answered, "My kingdom does not belong to this world. If my kingdom did belong to this world, my attendants would be fighting to keep me from being handed over to the Jews. But as it is, my kingdom is not here."

So Pilate said to him, V: "Then you are a king?"

Jesus answered, "You say I am a king. For this I was born and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth.

Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice."

Pilate said to him, "What is truth?"

When he had said this, he again went out to the Jews and said to them, "I find no guilt in him. But you have a custom that I release one prisoner to you at Passover. Do you want me to release to you the King of the Jews?" They cried out again, "Not this one but Barabbas!"

Now Barabbas was a revolutionary.

Then Pilate took Jesus and had him scourged. And the soldiers wove a crown out of thorns and placed it on his head, and clothed him in a purple cloak, and they came to him and said, "Hail, King of the Jews!" And they struck him repeatedly.

Once more Pilate went out and said to them, "Look, I am bringing him out to you, so that you may know that I find no guilt in him."

So Jesus came out, wearing the crown of thorns and the purple cloak. And he said to them, "Behold, the man!"

When the chief priests and the guards saw him they cried out, "Crucify him, crucify him!"

Pilate said to them, "Take him yourselves and crucify him. I find no guilt in him."

The Jews answered, "We have a law, and according to that law he ought to die, because he made himself the Son of God."

Now when Pilate heard this statement, he became even more afraid, and went back into the praetorium and said to Jesus, "Where are you from?" Jesus did not answer him.

So Pilate said to him, "Do you not speak to me? Do you not know that I have power to release you and I have power to crucify you?"

Jesus answered him, "You would have no power over me if it had not been given to you from above.

For this reason the one who handed me over to you has the greater sin."

Consequently, Pilate tried to release him; but the Jews cried out, "If you release him, you are not a Friend of Caesar. Everyone who makes himself a king opposes Caesar."

When Pilate heard these words he brought Jesus out and seated him on the judge's bench in the place called Stone Pavement, in Hebrew, Gabbatha. It was preparation day for Passover, and it was about noon. And he said to the Jews, "Behold, your king!"

They cried out, "Take him away, take him away! Crucify him!"

Pilate said to them, "Shall I crucify your king?"

The chief priests answered, "We have no king but Caesar." Then he handed him over to them to be crucified. So they took Jesus, and, carrying the cross himself, he went out to what is called the Place of the Skull, in Hebrew, Golgotha. There they crucified him, and with him two others, one on either side, with Jesus in the middle.

Pilate also had an inscription written and put on the cross. It read, "Jesus the Nazorean, the King of the Jews." Now many of the Jews read this inscription, because the place where Jesus was crucified was near the city; and it was written in Hebrew, Latin, and Greek. So the chief priests of the Jews said to Pilate, "Do not write 'The King of the Jews,' but that he said, 'I am the King of the Jews.'"

Pilate answered, "What I have written, I have written."

When the soldiers had crucified Jesus, they took his clothes and divided them into four shares, a share for each soldier. They also took his tunic, but the tunic was seamless, woven in one piece from the top down. So they said to one another, "Let's not tear it, but cast lots for it to see whose it will be," In order that the passage of Scripture might be fulfilled that says: They divided my garments among them, and for my vesture they cast lots. This is what the soldiers did.

Standing by the cross of Jesus were his mother and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary of Magdala. When Jesus saw his mother and the disciple there whom he loved he said to his mother, "Woman, behold, your son." Then he said to the disciple, "Behold, your mother." And from that hour the disciple took her into his home.

After this, aware that everything was now finished, in order that the Scripture might be fulfilled, Jesus said, "I thirst." There was a vessel filled with common wine. So they put a sponge soaked in wine on a sprig of hyssop and put it up to his mouth.

When Jesus had taken the wine, he said, "It is finished." And bowing his head, he handed over the spirit.

Here kneel / pause for a short time.

Now since it was preparation day, in order that the bodies might not remain on the cross on the sabbath, for the sabbath day of that week was a solemn one, the Jews asked Pilate that their legs be broken and that they be taken down. So the soldiers came and broke the legs of the first and then of the other one who was crucified with Jesus. But when they came to Jesus and saw that he was already dead, they did not break his legs, but one soldier thrust his lance into his side, and immediately blood and water flowed out.

An eyewitness has testified, and his testimony is true; he knows that he is speaking the truth, so that you also may come to believe. For this happened so that the Scripture passage might be fulfilled: Not a bone of it will be broken. And again another passage says: They will look upon him whom they have pierced.

After this, Joseph of Arimathea, secretly a disciple of Jesus for fear of the Jews, asked Pilate if he could remove the body of Jesus. And Pilate permitted it. So he came and took his body. Nicodemus, the one who had first come to him at night, also came bringing a mixture of myrrh and aloes weighing about one hundred pounds. They took the body of Jesus and bound it with burial cloths along with the spices, according to the Jewish burial custom.

Now in the place where he had been crucified there was a garden, and in the garden a new tomb, in which no one had yet been buried. So they laid Jesus there because of the Jewish preparation day; for the tomb was close by.

Reflection from Fr. Colm on the raising of Lazarus

Good morning everybody. Hello to all in our parish of the Durham Martyrs Parish. I do hope you're okay and coping with these extraordinary changes to our lives. My Lord, who would've thought it six months ago, three months ago, one month ago? For some of us it'll be a real confinement, for others it will be a constriction that might stretch our patience to the limit, to others it may be an opportunity to catch up in contacting friends and relatives. For me it's been a bit of all three really. However, I'd like to focus on the latter one, the contacts etc, friends I've been in touch with recently that I hadn't been in communication with for some time, more often than not they've phoned, texted or emailed to see how I was and I think one of the great things coming out of all this is the value of social media, isn't it? Technology. You hear it being knocked, criticised, yes it can be abused like so many other agents, but gosh it has come into its own I think of late.

Back to myself - it is humbling to know that I fall under the category of the vulnerable because of my age but I suppose there are times when our own physical limitations have to be accepted too and this is such a time I think for many of us. So how have you filled in your time? For myself, well, reading, watching television, listening to radio, reflecting and perhaps seeing the house in which I live in a more clearly and defined way, looking at things more closely. Stephen Fry was on Andrew Marr last Sunday morning and he talked about his own confinement and how he adapts now to what's taking place in his life by "taking his time about the ordinary, washing the dishes, cleaning the floors." These are ways of adapting, aren't they?

However, the stories that we constantly hear on a daily basis can be suffocating in many ways and the negativity that we hear, the negative news, real news of course, statistics, deaths, etc for me I have found it necessary to perhaps ease my way out of watching and listening to such stories. How I delight maybe watching the news when somebody, some newsreader with a smile on his or her face says "And now for some good news."

Well that's what I'm saying now to each and every one of you and to myself - "And now for some good news." Because that's what today's Gospel is about - Lazarus and the raising of Lazarus.

Martha, Mary, Lazarus that family of three, different personalities, they seem to have something that really Jesus found warm, welcoming, they're

kind, a place where he could be listened to perhaps? Just chill. However, this is changed dramatically with the death of Lazarus. Jesus is brought into a situation of great challenge to himself. Challenge in the context, we're told very clearly by St John, that He wept. "Jesus wept."

And then we're told when He heard and He realised the challenge ahead of Him, looking at the tomb in which Lazarus lay bound, that a sigh that came straight from the heart and he shouted out, *shouted out* - we're hearing all these wonderful physical expressions. We're learning more about the personality of Jesus in this Gospel, as few others.

These are the emotions, I think, that all of us are experiencing too at the moment. When I say emotions - the feeling of, a sense of helplessness. What can I do? How can I help? If I'm stuck at home, what do I say? What do I do? Can I accept indeed the help that maybe family members, younger members might want? Can I accept the limitations placed on my own activities and movements? It seems, that perhaps, some of the older generation in the parish, find that naturally enough, the most difficult to do. However this is what we're asked at this time, it's a time in which we can tune in again via media to Mass on a daily basis from various parts of the world, we can listen, we can reflect, we can pray, we can read - a multiplicity of things that we can do and are doing. And we are adapting - we will adapt even more.

And it's all about paradox, it's finding life in the ordinary here and now. That's what paradox is about. That's what the Gospel today is about. The paradox of life and death. Death does not have that same power over us, as we listen to this Gospel which is *very* often used at funerals and you can see why, because of the sense of positivity about it, the sense of optimism, the sense of anticipation, the sense and this one word that we need *desperately* today that word is **hope**.

Johann Tauler was a 14th century Dominican and he wrote "If only we could seek joy and sadness, peace and trouble, simplicity in multiplicity, comfort in bitterness, this is the way to become a true witness to God." That's what paradox is about in our lives today. That's what we as Christians, we as Catholics are called to perhaps explore more within the confines of our own hermitages which are now our homes. So, in many ways we've become contemplatives overnight.

Bless you all, and I will keep in touch. Do keep in touch with me also and let's pray for each other because we will come through this.

Reflection from Fr. Colm on Palm Sunday

Good morning everybody, this lovely morning I greet you from the presbytery here at St Joseph's in the parish of the Durham Martyrs and to all the parishioners and others I'd like to greet you especially on this Holy Week as we begin tomorrow with the Passion or today with the Passion of Jesus. Early enthusiasm has shifted quickly to the cross and a radical change has taken place - flowers to mud. From making popular headlines to the isolation of the cave, He was hemmed in by betrayal, by sin, pride and greed and there was no answer. "My God, My God" - no help, why? It happens us in a watered down way perhaps but for Him it was intense, and it was immediate. Darkness sets in, hope is lost, but is it?

For so many this is their story. Now, especially. A virus sweeps across our globe, across of our own very neighbourhoods. We too will have a lot of "whys" to ask. Why weren't we ready? Why can't a vaccine be found? Why can't we meet our loved ones? And these questions of why greet each other on a daily basis no more so than in the constant storm of tragic news that we get from the various news channels. But while hope was lost, it was quickly recovered in the Easter story, indeed not only recovered, it rose again.

But let's get back to that crowd. The crowd cheered initially, welcoming Him. That mass enthusiasm. We are so brave in a crowd, aren't we? As one man, a great philosopher said, "The crowd, the great enemy of reason, virtue and religion, that numerous piece of monstrosity, which taken asunder seems men, and reasonable creatures of God; but confused together, make one great beast." We see it often, but a crowd is not a community.

These past few weeks we have been deprived of our own community, especially our parish community and may be deprived of it into the foreseeable future. Added to this is the pain of not being able to meet the very members of our own families, confined to our own homes. Of course, we read, we garden, watch television. We can even compensate for our lack of exercise outside the home by home physical exertion as directed by fitness guru Joe Wicks or have all our best efforts at keeping fit and weight down as that other guru Jamie Oliver teaches us how to

bake comfort snacks and put the weight back on again. All diversions and *good* but none of this is people - flesh and blood - people. Our community and especially our Church community.

And that community is the familiar face that sits near me in church. Perhaps I don't even know his or her name, but I do miss them. I miss even their odd ways, their eccentricities, I miss too the warm smiles of greeting when we meet on a Sunday from others and surprise, surprise yes, I even miss those grumpy faces. I also miss the hymns, even the ones I don't like. I miss the choir, the music group, I also miss the coffee after Mass, those precious moments to catch up, the bit of gossip, the small talk and perhaps some occasion the deeper sharing of a particular worry or concern. I miss them all, deeply. And yes, I even miss the tedious sermons.

The Journalist Tim Stanley said on "Thought for the day" this week that recently how he always went to Mass with a very clear understanding that Mass was just a matter between him and God and on hearing that his parish Mass was suspended he looked forward to the many websites he could access Mass from home. However, after the first such screened Mass things changed. Yes, the priest was very good, but something was missing. He simply missed the people, the community.

We all miss each other and so we should. Isn't it a testimony to the strength of that same community, warts and all, that we miss it? And so, we enter this Holy of Holy weeks never imagining that we'd *ever* be doing so confined or be so confined in our homes. The one time of the year when we re-enact the why we still come together as Church for so many years, so many centuries is taken away from us.

Holy Thursday and the instruction on the Eucharist, Good Friday the meaning of suffering and then the finale, the great Easter Vigil and the Mass of the risen Lord on Easter Sunday it will all be different this year. Different that's all because we as a risen people can use and will use this week as a real opportunity for us to join together as community. Though physically separated we are together. United only as a community rooted in faith can be, in the power of Christ. God bless each one of you and we continue to pray for each other.

Keeping Cool Through COVID-19

Coping with stress related to the COVID-19 crisis

Many of us experience stress, anxiety or depression and it would be natural, with all of the current uncertainty and fear, if those feelings have worsened, or indeed, if you have experienced them for the first time.

Our lives have changed radically; the events we were looking forward to, family get togethers, trips, meetings with friends, or simply going to Church, have been cancelled and we find ourselves isolated at home or in a busy, overwhelmed workplace where much has changed. Many of us are separated from our loved ones and over the coming weeks, we will begin to know of people who have been affected by the virus. We may even become poorly ourselves.

It can be hard to know where to turn and what information to trust, especially as the situation is changing so quickly. We have written this note to give you some ideas to help you to stay mentally well over the coming weeks and to signpost you to a variety of different places that you can call on for help if you need it. People's needs will vary enormously and it's important that you find the right support and advice for you.

We will keep this updated as new ideas and resources become available.

Common and very normal emotions to be feeling right now:

You may of course be feeling at peace with the current situation; you may be enjoying the break from work or the slowing down of life around you. However, many parishioners will be feeling more negative feelings which might include:

Fear and anxiety - you might be worried about the virus and how it might affect you or your loved ones.

Anger, frustration and confusion – an inability to choose what you do, might make you feel powerless, angry or frustrated. It can be difficult to understand what to do because of the volume of different information available.

Sadness and boredom – you may feel disconnected from important people and events in your life. Many of your normal activities will have stopped and you may have time on your hands.

Anxiety - is something that we all experience from time to time. The experience of anxiety is our body's way of preparing us to manage those difficult situations. Sometimes anxiety can help us to perform better by making us more alert and motivated – it drives our fight/flight response. However, if it sticks around for a long time, it can also have a negative impact. You might experience any of the following physical symptoms: racing heart or breath, tense muscles, new aches and pains, sweating or dizziness, shaking, nausea or 'butterflies' in your tummy. In your head, you might find your worries running away with you, have trouble paying attention or find it hard to relax or to sleep.

Ideas to help you to maintain a healthy head space

Many of these activities have been found by doctors to help people to relieve stress, anxiety or depression and to help us to feel more resilient. Not all of these will work for you but take a look and perhaps pick one which appeals and start there.

Stay connected to others

- Pray to help you to feel connected to God who is with us through all of this.
- Stay connected to your family and friends via social media or on the good oldfashioned telephone.
- Write a loved one a letter they will love to receive it.
- Find someone locally who needs your help and do their shopping for them.
- Talk to someone about your feelings (see links at the end).
- If you are fit and healthy, volunteer (see links at the end).
- If you are lonely, then try some of the links at the end or call us for a chat; we have fellow parishioners ready and waiting to talk to you.

Be creative and adaptable

- Draw a picture or paint something.
- Write a story, a poem or a song or simply record your thoughts in a diary at the end of the day.
- Write a prayer.
- Do some colouring in.
- Create a new recipe.
- Write a guiz for your family or a new game.
- Have a sing song. Many neighbours are meeting at a safe distance for a neighbourly sing.
- If you have a hobby, try to do it or experience it in a new way. If you love music, for example, try to find a new artist or genre that you enjoy. If you love reading, try out a new author.

Set yourself a goal or a target

- Mend something.
- Make something.
- Learn something new sign up for an online course or learn how to play a musical instrument. Or find a new language to learn online or conduct some online research.
- Learn your favourite poem off by heart.
- Decorate a room or start a DIY project.
- Read a new book how about the bible can you read it all?
- Do that thing you have been meaning to for ages but have been too busy to begin.

Relax

- Take a break from the 24-hour news cycle; just switch it on once a day for an update.
- Get out amongst nature in your garden or take a walk.
- To help you to sleep, turn off all computers, tablets, TVs etc well before you go to bed. Have a warm bath or a relaxing shower, with a candle and some music.
- Play a musical instrument or listen to some music.
- Read a book, watch a film.
- Do more activities which you know relax you.

Look after yourself mentally

- Pray on your own or with your family.
- Do a list every day of all the things you have to thank God for. Try to add one thing to it each day. Ask your family to join in.
- Be kind to yourself this is a difficult time for everyone, so allow yourself to not be perfect.
- Notice your thoughts and start noticing which ones are influencing your anxiety and what your triggers are. This is the first step in learning to manage them.
- Close your eyes and pay attention to your breathing – or if that is difficult for you, listen to the sounds around you. This is a good way of interrupting a cycle of anxious thought. See the mindfulness resources at the end for more information.

Look after yourself physically

- Eat well and keep well hydrated.
- Don't overdo the alcohol or the drugs.
- Exercise go for a walk or a run or if you can't get out, do some simple exercises in your garden, home, chair or bed. There are lots of free exercises sessions online right now.
- Do some gentle bends and stretches.
- Ask one of your loved ones to give you a shoulder or a head massage – set up a homebased spa!
- Paint your nails, experiment with your makeup, try your hair in a different style, buy (or make) a face pack.
- Take a long soak in the bath.
- Sit in the sunshine.
